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


What is a Youth Work Portfolio

- ❖ It is a tool created by the Council of Europe and addressed to organizers and youth workers, professional or volunteer.
- ❖ It allows you to present your skills according to quality European standards.
- ❖ Its use also contributes to describe and evaluate your experiences and expertise, as well as to recognize your work, education, and learning.

How to use it


- ❖ Go to the website : <http://www.coe.int/fr/web/youth-portfolio>
- ❖ Click on “Take a look at the Council of Europe Youth Work Portfolio and start using it!”
- ❖ In the *Authentication* section, click on “**create an account**” then log-in the required information (name, first name, password, e-mail address, verification)
